



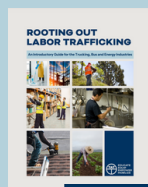
NATIONAL HUMAN TRAFFICKING PREVENTION MONTH WEBINAR OUTLINES

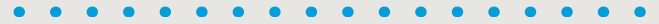
Week 1 - Modern Slavery at Work: Recognizing and Responding to Labor Trafficking

Session features:

- 45-50 minute presentation by a TAT representative
 - Features a video of Kwami Adoboe-Herrera, labor trafficking survivor and former member of the United States Advisory Council on Human Trafficking for the U.S. Department of State, discussing this crime
- Take-away resources and action steps



Labor traffickers make \$64 billion in illicit profits annually through the exploitation of vulnerable individuals in forced labor situations. Labor trafficking survivors have reported interacting with key TAT industries and agencies in a variety of ways during their victimization. Thus, personnel in TAT's partner industries and agencies have opportunities to encounter and identify victims of labor trafficking as part of their daily work.



In this session, you will learn how to evaluate the risks of labor trafficking and develop a plan to prevent, detect and respond to it in your industry and community.

Week 2 - Disaster and Exploitation: Understanding the Link Between Crisis and Trafficking

Both during and in the aftermath of natural disasters, the collapse of infrastructure and displacement of populations create a fertile ground for human traffickers. These criminals identify and exploit vulnerabilities created or compounded by natural disasters in order to profit off disaster victims and/or relief efforts.



In this session, you will learn the ways natural disasters increase the risk for human trafficking victimization and action steps to unite public- and private-sector stakeholders to implement anti-trafficking strategies within disaster planning and response.

Week 3 - Shut Out Human Trafficking: Major Sports Events and Human Trafficking

Featuring TAT's Driving Force partner, UPS

How can you help combat human trafficking during the World Cup and other major sports events? Human trafficking is an everyday and everywhere issue, but significant increases of people in concentrated areas can lead to location-specific spikes. As the need for transportation services also increases in those areas, TAT's partners are uniquely positioned to make a difference.



This session will discuss the connection between major events and human trafficking, explore how the public and private sectors can bolster their vigilance, and feature a case study from UPS on their World Cup preparations in Atlanta and across North America.

Week 4 - The Role of Parents and Trusted Adults in Combating Human Trafficking and Online Exploitation

Human traffickers and online predators routinely target potential victims they feel can be easily manipulated and controlled. As such, young people are often preyed upon by exploiters. Parents, caregivers and trusted adults are uniquely positioned to educate youth about these risks, implement protections for them and identify indicators that a young person is being groomed or exploited.



In this session, you will learn about the ways you can combat human trafficking in your community, including how to navigate age-appropriate conversations with young people to empower them to identify safe adults in their lives.

 - Features TAT Training Specialist/Survivor Leader Kelley Marshall, a sex trafficking survivor, who will share insight on the impact vulnerabilities and lack of community support can have on at-risk young people
