At the event, TAT provided targeted action steps and free resources for attendees to use within their companies and agencies.

IMPACT IN ACTION

Coalition Builds inspire leaders from trucking companies, truck stops, bus companies, public transit agencies, energy companies, transportation associations, government agencies and law enforcement agencies to act, while equipping them with the practical tools they need to become force multipliers in the anti-human trafficking movement.

Since the Tucson Coalition Build:

- Valley Metro featured an article on human trafficking in the May Security Bus-Blotter, spotlighting TAT's bus and transit resources and urging drivers to utilize the Arizona Human Trafficking Hotline. This publication reached 800 contracted bus operators.
- The SouthEastern Arizona Governments
 Organization (SEAGO) showcased TAT's 7minute transit video during its August
 Regional Transportation Coordination
 meeting and encouraged participants to
 download the TAT app. SEAGO committed
 to distributing TAT wallet cards at future
 events.
- A new partnership emerged as HSI presented at two transportation coordination meetings and SEAGO's regional meeting.
- TAT provided three actionable human trafficking tips to the Arizona Human Trafficking Hotline/Arizona Counter Terrorism Information Center.
- The South West Transit Association is including a session on human trafficking at their annual conference in 2025.

- The Arizona Anti-Trafficking Network and the Arizona Transit Association partnered with TAT to create a co-branded human trafficking informational flyer that is being distributed throughout the state and was made available at Arizona's state transit conference.
- The Arizona Transit Association leadership has joined the Arizona Anti-Trafficking Network, underscoring their commitment to the cause.
- The Arizona Department of Transportation is integrating TAT's Law Enforcement Modules and has requested TAT materials for statewide distribution.
- The Arizona Anti-Trafficking Network reported strengthened collaboration among agencies, enabling future initiatives such as SOAP (Save Our Adolescents from Prostitution) outreach and an educational summit ahead of the world-famous gem show.
- The Arizona Department of Transportation has committed to displaying TAT posters in all of their MVD locations statewide.
